aritas Nigeria was established in Education departments etc, to execute September 2010 by the Catholic Bishops Conference of Nigeria (CBCN), as a specialized national relief and development agency with a mandate for overall coordination of development programs for the Catholic Church in Nigeria. Although independently registered, Caritas Nigeria is an arm of the Church and Society Department of the Catholic Secretariat of Nigeria (CSN). The legal name of the organization is Catholic Caritas Foundation of Nigeria (CCFN), however it is generally known as Caritas Nigeria.

The Catholic Church in Nigeria has a total of 55 dioceses grouped into 9 provinces which cover the entire geographical spread of Nigeria. Caritas Nigeria serves as the umbrella organization supporting these regional institutions to implement development-oriented programs based on local needs. At the Diocesan and Provincial levels, Caritas Nigeria works with the existing structures of Church and Society: Justice, Development and Peace/Caritas (JDPC), Health, Family and Human Life, diocesan

programs impacting on human life and dignity. Caritas Nigeria also partners with relevant CSOs, CBOs, FBOs, NGOs and Government agencies to implement programs in various states.

As part of the universal mission of the Church, Caritas Nigeria targets beneficiaries on the basis of rights and need, and not based on creed, race or nationality.

The Catholic Church is known to be one of the oldest and greatest institutions in the world providing in addition to spiritual growth, access to good education, healthcare delivery services emergency and humanitarian assistance to the poor, vulnerable and excluded persons regardless of race or religion. In Nigeria, the Catholic Church has 1384 Health facilities and 375 schools mostly spread across hard-to-reach communities in the 36 states and Federal Capital Territory in Nigeria. Caritas Nigeria works with other Church Structures and relevant agencies to provide underserved groups/communities access to these services.

FOREWORD – Most. Rev. Lucius Ugorji EPISCOPAL CHAIRMAN

aritas is at the heart of the Church, according to Pope Francis. Caritas indeed is one of the three planks on which the Church's mission stands. The Church's mission is an integrated mission to evangelise, to nurture and to show love. This is expressed succinctly in Deus Caritas Est when Pope Benedict XVI said "*The Church's deepest nature* is expressed in her three-fold responsibility: of proclaiming the word of God (*kerygma-martyria*), celebrating the sacraments (*leitourgia*) and exercising the ministry of charity (*diakonia*). These duties presuppose each other and are inseparable" (*Deus Caritas Est*, 25).

Charity is also not a restricted activity of individuals; groups, communities, nations could do charity. 'The Church is also called as a whole to the exercise of the *diakonia* of charity, whether in the small communities of particular Churches or on the level of the universal Church.'(Cf Motu Proprio).

Charity cannot be a haphazard activity. Pope Benedict XVI insisted it must be something organized. Although there is the natural instinct to love and care, charity cannot depend exclusively on instinct or impulse but through a rational process of organisation. This is why it is extremely important to coordinate. Coordination begins at the local community/parish level to the diocesan, provincial and subsequently the national office, which has this overall mandate on behalf of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Nigeria (CBCN).



2014: A YEAR IN REVIEW

he year 2014 was quite dramatic and far reaching in its implications. Two world wide events had direct impact on Nigeria, with a third actually originating from Nigeria and reverberating around the world. The two refer to the Ebola crisis, which Nigeria contained impressively, with the Catholic Church making significant contributions, and the global fall in oil prices of the Nigerian economy. The issue originating from Nigeria concerned the kidnap of the more than 200 girls from Chibok, Borno State. The whole world was united in one cry: #Bringbackourgirls#.

Around the world other events such as the South Korean ferry that sank, with hundreds missing, leading to the resignation of the Prime Minister, the Russian-Ukraine crisis, leading to the shooting of a plane with 298 passengers; the disappearance of the Malaysian plane with about 200 passengers, the Turkey mine disaster with hundreds dead, and the emergence of the Islamic State, became some of the worst events in mankind's recent history. On the flip side, the world banded together in solidarity.

Other more positive events included the extraordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops on the Family held in Rome, with the ordinary assembly holding this year (2015). Others included the landing of the European Spacecraft Rosetta on a comet, the Sochi Winter Olympics, the breakthrough in US-Cuban relations, and of course Facebook buying WhatsApp for a whopping 19 Billion US Dollars...

For Caritas Nigeria however it was a year to be mostly grateful. Caritas Nigeria continued its expansion in terms of its program areas. For instance rather than dwindle, Caritas Nigeria support from Centres for Disease Control(CDC) for the HIV/AIDS program got a boost, affording expansion in Benue, Kaduna and possibly Lagos States. Currently 30 Comprehensive Care & Treatment (CCT) facilities, 99 Prevention of Mother To Child Transmission facilities and 7 Community Based Organisations help to implement the comprehensive HIV AIDS program with more than a hundred thousand persons being affected positively in one way or another.

The Support for Vulnerable Households Accelerated Revenue Earnings (Share) program in Sokoto, Kebbi and FCT which uses agriculture as an entry point, continues to be a means of creating wealth for poor populations in the North. Working with about 9 Civil Society Organisations, this project will touch the lives of about 42,000 persons some of who will receive conditional cash transfers (CCTs). It is heartwarming knowing how much the Catholic Bishops' Conference is touching lives through Caritas Nigeria.

CCFN institutional capacity strengthening program got a boost with the training of trainers on Program Management for Development Professionals (PMD-Pro). Lingos program director John Cropper was in- country to lead the two week training which has equipped Caritas Nigeria with enough human resources as trainers. Caritas Nigeria therefore could organize trainings in- country and equip development sector workers with common knowledge and tools.

Meanwhile, the CAFOD supported Good Governance and Gender program has continued to get deepened, with a success story of a group of women organizing themselves for participation in politics and actually campaigning jointly for themselves, although only one person scaled through. This program too saw to the participation of Caritas Nigeria/JDPC in the observation of the elections in Ekiti and Osun, and Caritas Nigeria/JDPC further accreditation to observe the 2015 general elections.

With regards to Emergencies it was a year of internally displaced persons, with nearly a million people displaced from their ancestral communities because of Boko Haram. Caritas Nigeria gave supplementary food rations to Maiduguri, Yola, Shendam, Katsina Ala, Jalingo in ensuring that they took care of displaced persons within their jurisdictions. Some of the support came from the Caritas network, with some coming from Caritas Nigeria local fund raising efforts. As for the local fundraising efforts, about 1999 men, women and youths pledged to support Caritas Nigeria with amounts ranging from five hundred naira to ten thousand naira a year. Local fundraising continues to present a challenge as Nigerians are used to one-off donations for particular projects. The numerous activities in parishes continue to present a situation where national programs appear as a distraction.

Caritas Nigeria plan for a property got a boost with the Administrative Board of the Catholic Bishops Conference of Nigeria approving of its plans. The building could not commence because of issues with land re-certification but should hopefully begin in 2015. Caritas Nigeria also initiated the purchase of four plots of land in Akamkpa, near the College of Education.

Caritas Nigeria also spread herself around a bit, with a desk in Lagos, Benin and an office in Sokoto and Kebbi. The desk in Lagos has our Communications Specialist occupying it, while Sokoto and Kebbi offices are state offices of the SHARE program; Benin desk coordinates our anti human trafficking program, where Edo State is a major catchment area. In the course of the year Caritas Nigeria was invited to participate in a symposium on Poverty and the Family, organized by Caritas Internationalis in conjunction with the Pontifical Council for the Family. Caritas Nigeria Executive Secretary Fr. Evaristus Bassey made a contribution that is being published in a volume by the organisers.

Similarly, Caritas Nigeria participated in an international symposium organized by the International Centre for Voluntary Agencies (ICVA) in Geneva in November. The objective was to understand the Humanitarian Country Team which is usually coordinated by the UN, and how local civil society organizations could key into the platform and become more influential in the coordination of emergencies and humanitarian interventions. Caritas Nigeria Executive Secretary attended the symposium.

Last year was a time too that the Caritas Internationalis management standards got to Caritas Nigeria and plans were put in place to integrate them. Luckily Caritas Nigeria built its systems in line with international standards, thus most of the management standards were already in place.

In order to align more with existing structures, Caritas Nigeria proposed to its board about working closely with St. Vincent de Paul

> Society. This would mean effectively that in some of its emergency relief to groups of individuals, Caritas Nigeria could work with Society of St. Vincent de Paul to reach the poor directly.

> It was a year of modest achievements, a year of gratitude amidst all the shocks around the world.

EMERGENCY AND HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

mergency and Humanitarian Assistance is one of Caritas Nigeria's core areas of intervention. In 2014, Caritas Nigeria Emergency Unit was saddled with the enormous task of responding to the many challenges from man-made disasters around the country, resulting from the terrorism in the North East and the crisis with the fulani herdsmen in Benue and Nassarawa. **Project Title:** Social Transfer for

Emergency Response in States affected by Project Activities: Insurgency and Farmers/Fulani Herdsmen Conflict in Nigeria

The Goal of the Project was to support Populations affected by insecurity in Borno, Adamawa, Yobe, Taraba, Benue and Plateau States to be able to meet their basic food needs.

Intended Beneficiaries: This intervention was initially targeted at 2000 of the most vulnerable Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) households in each community. The following criteria was adopted in the selection of the beneficiaries:

- Project start up meeting/training with • local Caritas teams.
- Sensitization of host community leaders • and local government officials.
- Negotiations with local food Vendor.
- Constitution of community project implementation committees (CPICs).
- Assessment of IDP and host households.
- Registration of beneficiary households.
- Procurement of Food items.
- Food Distribution.
- Activity monitoring.

Key Achievements

The Project initially targeted 2000 families in all. But in view of the overwhelming population of internally displaced persons (IDPs) whose food needs ought to be addressed, and in order for the diocesan Caritas offices not to cause any form of disaffection amongst the IDPS, we decided to provide Supplementary Rations in a one-off distribution which addressed food needs of 11,060 Households in the affected dioceses (states).

In October, 2014 Caritas Nigeria also distributed food items to families who fled their homes in Gwoza. Borno state in the wake of massive attacks on them perpetrated by the dreaded Boko Haram Islamic sect, and are now residing in a squatter camp in new Kuchingoro, behind the Games village in Area 1, Abuja. The food items distributed enabled over 50 Households approximately 350 individuals on an average of seven persons per household address their immediate food needs. The food items distributed took into consideration their staple food. The following food items were distributed: 3 bags of Rice, 2 bags of Guinea Corn, 2 bags of Maize, 2 bags of Beans, A 25 litre Gallon of Palm Oil, A 25 litre Gallon of Vegetable Oil, 2 bags of salt, 2 Cartoons of Fish and a cartoon of Condiments.

Together with Sr. Ann Falola of Mission and Dialogue, the ES held a meeting with FCT Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and advocated for water for the community.

Networking and Collaborations

Caritas Nigeria is a member of several Coordinating bodies for Emergency Preparedness and Response. Caritas Nigeria participates and contributes to development of the National Strategic Response and Preparedness Plan in the country especially with the current security challenges and humanitarian crises in the North Eastern part of Nigeria.

aritas Nigeria has continued to demonstrate capacity in implementing maternal, new-born and child health (MNCH) interventions, as well as communicable and non-communicable Activities currently supported in the diseases control programs through a network of over 100 faith-based primary and secondary health facilities. Our current health programme is a 5-year HIV/AIDS prevention, care and treatment program funded by the United States' Centres for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC) called the Sustainable HIV/AIDS Care and Treatment Action in Nigeria (SUSTAIN). Now in its third year, SUSTAIN has a goal of "reducing morbidity and mortality due to HIV infection in Nigeria" by providing lifesaving anti-retroviral drugs to People Living with HIV/AIDS (PLHIVs) through faithbased health facilities in under-served and hard to reach communities. The project also supports community based organizations (CBOs) to deliver HIV prevention interventions to at-risk and vulnerable groups as well as working with Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC) and their caregivers.

In line with the national plan to eliminate Mother to Child Transmission (eMTCT) of HIV, SUSTAIN has a strong focus on preventing new infections in women of childbearing age, creating demand for uptake of ante-natal care, and providing access to Prevention of Mother To Child Transmission (PMTCT) services for pregnant and

breastfeeding HIV positive mothers.

The program presently supports over 55,000 active clients in 102 health facilities, comprising of both comprehensive and standalone PMTCT sites, across 12+1 states in Nigeria, namely; Benue, Kaduna, Kogi, Nasarawa, Plateau States; Delta; Ekiti, Oyo, Ondo, Ogun, Osun, Lagos; and the Federal Capital Territory (FCT). In addition, 7 Community Based Organizations have been engaged

in some of the aforementioned States to provide HIV Prevention and OVC related services.

SUSTAIN program include:

- Community Sensitization and Demand Creation for HIV services (particularly HIV testing)
- HIV Prevention and Behaviour Change Communication
- Support to Orphans and Vulnerable Children (including health, education, legal support)
- HIV Testing and Counseling
- HIV/AIDS Treatment, Care and Support
- Tuberculosis/HIV Collaborative Activities (including Tuberculosis diagnosis and treatment)
- Laboratory Services support and upgrades
- Pharmacy Services support
- Logistics Management and Information System
- Strategic Information and support for Electronic Medical Records
- Health Systems Strengthening

regional Governments as well as Donor Agencies. These coordination networks have resulted in Caritas Nigeria actively participating in Technical Working Groups, Workshops and Meetings to improve the quality of patient care systems. The SUSTAIN team works closely with government HIV units including the National AIDS and STI Control Program (NASCP), National Agency for the Control of AIDS, the National Tuberculosis and Leprosy Control Program (NTBLCP) and their state-level equivalents. SUSTAIN is an active member of the National HIV Drug Resistance Committee and also participated in the development of key policy documents like the 2014 National Integrated ART Guidelines and the 2014 HIV Care and Support Guidelines during the period under review.

GOOD GOVERNANCE

Nigeria though endowed with both human and material resources, has not been able to harness these resources for the overall well being of her citizens. This is attributable to weak governance structure ranging from poor management of resources to the high level of citizen apathy to governance issues.

Caritas Nigeria Good Governance and Gender Action for Peoples Development (G & G) Program seeks to enhance the capacity of the Church in Nigeria to support quality interventions in transparency, accountability and citizen participation in governance. The project has three aspects:

- 1. To address issues that will bring about good governance using the Caritas Nigeria and the Justice Development and Peace Commission (JDPC) in Idah and Lokoja Dioceses of Kogi State, in North-Central, Nigeria.
- 2. Implement activities that bring about gender development (equality & component of the activities in the project with the Center for Women Studies and interventions (CSWI).

3. Institutional capacity strengthening with a focus on supporting the capacity of Caritas Nigeria to boost its visibility, fundraising capacity and address emergency preparedness & response issues.

The G&G program is supported by the Catholic Agency For Overseas Development (CAFOD).

- Contributed in the National Health Bill, 2014 using the Think Tank Committee.
- Trained and mentored 36 women political aspirants in Kogi State towards the 2015 General Election.
- Held the good governance week in Kogi State which brought key stakeholders together to brainstorm on good governance issues in Kogi State.
- Formed the Nexus Forum, a group of Civil Society Organisations committed to good governance in Kogi State.
- Organized town hall meetings in Kogi State.

LIVELIHOODS AND AGRICULTURE

aritas Nigeria has implemented some pockets of projects in this area and its current livelihoods intervention is the Support to Vulnerable Households for Accelerated Revenue Earnings (SHARE) program.

SHARE is a 5-year project that focuses on empowering communities to improve their

Four hundred households in 16 communities were identified as beneficiaries to receive the disbursement of unconditional cash transfers that will last for 15 months.

Key Achievements of the SHARE program in 2014:

livelihoods through enhanced agricultural production, income generation activities, nutrition/water and sanitation and unconditional cash transfers.

The SHARE project goal is to help 42,000 very poor households in Sokoto, Kebbi states and the FCT grow their agricultural production and incomes and improve the nutrition of their women and children. Caritas Nigeria is partnering with Catholic Relief Services and Mercy Corps to implement this project. It is a five-year project supported by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID).

The Goal of the SHARE Program is to **'reduce poverty of Households in Nigeria'** through;

- Agricultural production and productivity
- Income generation
- Nutrition and WASH
- Strengthening Local Governance system and poverty reduction.



ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING & MIGRATION

aritas Nigeria Anti-Human Trafficking and Migration Desk provide National coordination for the Catholic Church in Nigeria. The program is aimed at combating human rights abuses, human trafficking and irregular migration. The greatest achievement of Caritas Nigeria in this regard is the institution of an awareness creation day by the Catholic Bishops Conference of Nigeria on every Sunday after the Feast of St. Bakhita. In



2014 Caritas Nigeria animated the 55 dioceses on this issue including direct communication with parishes that are on its data base.

The following are objectives of the Desk:

- Sensitization and awareness creation on the dangers of human trafficking and irregular migration in our society
- Networking and building linkages with

other organizations/international bodies working on human trafficking and migration

- Identification of program funding opportunities to support anti-human trafficking and migration programs.
- Organization of capacity building sessions/workshops on human trafficking and smuggling of migrants for Caritas Nigeria staff and Local Partners to improve program quality.
- Rehabilitation and re-integration of victims of trafficking.

Caritas Nigeria supports the JDPCs and other sister organizations in enlightenment campaigns; raising awareness and consciousness of people about the vices and dangers of Human Trafficking which is referred to as modern day slavery. On the 30th of July 2013, Caritas Nigeria commemorated the First UN World Day Against Trafficking in Persons; the event was marked not only by the National Office but by most Dioceses as well. Similarly the Church World Anti-Human Trafficking Day was marked on the feast of St. Josephine Bahkita on February 8th, 2015 through awareness creation in parishes.

Also working with diocesan Caritas and sister agencies, the program officer provides psychosocial support for trafficked victims. Caritas Nigeria provides linkages to agencies that can help trafficked victims. Working more on prevention, Caritas Nigeria has tried to reduce the vulnerability of young active adolescents and women in some of the Dioceses by encouraging them to start up small businesses or acquire skills which could enable them cater for their needs and that of their families thereby reducing the prevalence of falling prey to traffickers in those areas and ultimately reducing poverty which is acclaimed the root cause of human trafficking in Nigeria.

Caritas Nigeria has been networking and collaborating with organizations working in the area of Anti-Human Trafficking, Irregular Migration and Child Labour, Agencies like; Network Against Child Trafficking Abuse and Labour (NACTAL), National Agency for the Prohibition of Trafficking In Persons (NAPTIP), Committee for the Support of Dignity Of Women (COSUDOW) and COATNET.

Caritas Nigeria became a member of Christian Organizations Against Trafficking in Human Beings (COATNET) and has been attending it's meeting to further strengthen the Human Trafficking work of the organization. The organization has also participated in international symposia/conferences and will be hosting a program on Anti-Human trafficking in 2015 in collaboration with COATNET and Caritas Internationalis.



aritas Nigeria provides capacity building and institutional strengthening support for Church institutions through meetings, workshops, assessments, trainings, on the job mentoring and technical assistance. Caritas Nigeria realizes that capacity building is key to sustainable development, Caritas Nigeria is building and improving project management capacity of Church istitutions and development workers across Nigeria to effectively respond to humanitarian and development needs of the Church.

The strategy for implementing the project is based on the concept of 'on the job training'. The church institutions that have undergone HOCAI capacity assessments are provided seed grants to implement a project to address a need which they have identified in their respective communities. The process involves the Church partners identifying a problem/issue, and developing a project proposal to address the issue. CCFN with support from CRS Nigeria evaluates the submitted proposals and also provide technical assistance to the partners to enable them select a suitable project that can be implemented easily. The partners are then trained and coached through the course of the project implementation on the various aspects of program management and financial management. The identified system

weaknesses during HOCAI evaluation are also corrected in the course of this process. Key Achievements

The most significant results were achieved through the write-shops and small grants scheme.

The first write-shop had 50% success with regards to the number of organizations that were finally selected for the project implementation.

The second write-shop achieved a 100% success in terms of organizations that were successful in the SMILE funding application. A proposal development write-shop for the SMILE project was for six Church partners namely: JDPC Auchi, JDPC Abuja, JDPC Idah, JDPC Lafia, JDPC Gboko and JDPC Katsinaala. During the write-shop, presentations were made on what the likely expectations of the donor maybe and their draft proposals are reviewed accordingly. The participating organizations were then guided on what corrections to make on their draft proposals before submitting them. After the write-shop some of the partners still sent in their proposals for a final review before submission.

A number of significant results were achieved through the small grants scheme. The results cut across all the participating organizations. Some of these results/outputs include -:

The participating organizations also had management and financial management as indicated they had challenges with securing project funding awards, inadequate knowledge on program management and inadequate knowledge on financial management.

The ICS project enabled these organizations to address most of these challenges through organizations have improved significantly in sustainable project management. developing funding proposals, program

Furthermore, in collaboration with Catholic Relief Services and Learning In NGOS (LINGOS), Caritas Nigeria is now the training hub for Project Management courses for Development Professionals (PMD Pro) in West Africa and in the next fiscal year the workshops and mentoring exercises. At the organization hopes to have trained a sizeable end of FY14, the capacities of these number of development profesionals in



aritas Nigeria ensures that gender is mainstreamed into its programs/projects and policies to ensure that the needs of men, women, boys and girls are addressed specifically in program design and implementation and in the organization as a whole. In addressing this, a review of CCFN Gender policy was done. Following the findings from the review, the management is currently working towards providing Crèche for staff who are nursing mothers for a more gender sensitive work environment.

One of the objectives of Caritas Nigeria's Good governance program is aimed at educating and empowering women and girls specifically to participate in governance and in decision making in their communities and states as a whole.

During this reporting period, Caritas Nigeria conducted technical support visits to two partner dioceses- Idah and Lokoja dioceses. The Gender focal staff supported the diocesan project teams to conduct gender analysis of their project implementation plans identifying gender sensitive strategies for an improved gender mainstreaming into their projects. A-one-day coaching session focusing on essential gender concepts was carried out to enhance partners' knowledge and expertise in making their projects more gender sensitive.

Key Achievements in 2014

- Conducted Gender Audit for 3 diocesan partners.
- Conducted sensitization and awareness creation activities to strengthen women participation in decision making.
- Built the capacity of project staff of 2 diocesan partners- Lokoja and Idah dioceses -Participants were equipped with knowledge and expertise to mainstream a gender perspective in Good governance program
- Supported the 2 partner dioceses to conduct gender analysis of their project implementation plans

RESOURCE MOBILIZATION AND VISIBILTY

aritas Nigeria has been making strategic efforts to increase local fundraising to support its development interventions as is her mandate by the Catholic Bishops Conference of Nigeria.

In this regards, several strategies have been employed to increase its local funding base. Based on previous experience, it was clear that one of the best ways to do so will be to first create awareness of its existence through Lagos Archdioceses to conduct Parish fundraising, corporate organization sponsorship and to promote visibility of Caritas Nigeria in Lagos and Nigeria at large.

Caritas Nigeria then decided to focus on promoting the visibility of the organization and raise funds for the sustainability of Caritas Nigeria. The following are strategies that were proposed:


• Caritas Nigeria conducted Fundraising in four Parishes in Abuja with the



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following results: Karimo (95 men, 223 women =318), Nyanya (426men, 606women= 1032), Wuse (208men, 317women = 525), and Games Village (124). A total of 1999 persons responded to the call for pledges ranging from 10,000 naira to five hundred naira a year with only a few reaching the 100,000 Naira margin. Parish visitation seems to be the most effective means of reaching out to Catholics in Nigeria. The responses have been consistent as well, even if they are small amounts. The level of distrust existing in the minds of Nigerians make the direct contact in ecclesial communities the most effective means of sensitizing and garnering support for Caritas Nigeria initiatives. There is need to upscale this approach nationally.

- An advocacy meeting was held in Imo State with JDPC coordinators.
- Attempts were made to sell the idea of corporate sponsorship to ABC Transport and Chisco Transport to have them donate a fraction of every ticket cost to Caritas Nigeria. There has been no positive response yet.

The Church's Prophetic Voice through **Caritas Nigeria** and **JDPC**

he Church has a responsibility to be the voice of the voiceless, especially in her preferential option for the poor. Sometimes even when other stakeholders have expressed a position on an issue, the generality of people also want to hear the voice of the Church. Caritas Nigeria and JDPC therefore rise up to the occasion.

One major happenstance in 2014 that drew world attention was the kidnap of more than 200 girls from a school in Chibok, Borno State Nigeria. Caritas Nigeria apart from organizing a prayer rally, issued a widely circulated would take care of root causes. Apart from Boko Haram terrorists. Another major event was the state election held in Osun. This election was crucial in moving forward popular confidence in the electoral process; it was the election that would have marred or made the credibility of the vote. Osun State is controlled by the opposition All Progressives Congress (APC). There was great speculation that the deployment of security forces was meant to intimidate voters and skew the elections towards the ruling Peoples' Democratic Party, (PDP). Caritas Nigeria was involved with observing the elections and issued a statement on the conduct of the election which was won by the opposition. Caritas Nigeria in fairness to truth, congratulated the electoral body, the people of Osun and the re-elected governor. This election helped to restore confidence in the electoral system.

With the renewed acts of terrorism and increasing displacement of persons internally, Caritas Nigeria held a press conference urging a change in the lifestyle of Nigerians, berating the generality of people for their insensitivity towards the suffering segment. Caritas Nigeria/JDPC lamented a situation where Nigerians in other parts of the country lived as if everything was okay and urged Nigerians to spare a thought to hundreds of thousands of Nigerians living in a war situation. '*The tragedy is that the rest of the country is moving on as if nothing catastrophic is happening. Politicians are gathering, multi million naira parties being hosted, and everyone is carrying* on with business as usual. Is it that we have heard so much about Boko Haram that these happenings are no longer news but have become normal daily narratives? But imagine being displaced in your own country! Imagine running for hours for safety. Imagine not being certain if you would eat for days. Imagine having to sleep in the hills for days and weeks. Imagine not having a bath for days and wearing the same cloth...' However the attempt for a mass appeal through the media did not yield much result in terms of financial appeals. However many Christian churches, perhaps as an aftermath, resolved to support the churches in the North East.

On learning of the 'death' of Shekau, the leader of the Boko Haram, Caritas Nigeria issued a statement congratulating the military. The essence of this statement was to show that the Church was not just out to condemn but also to encourage and express joy. This period witnessed a boost in the morale of soldiers and subsequent victories, although about two weeks later, Shekau in a video, said he was alive. Speculation has it that Shekau actually had been killed but the terrorists were manipulating electronic images. Caritas Nigeria referred to it as 'second death', allowing room for doubt, and urged the military to use the momentum to be on the offensive rather than being often reactive.

Towards the end of the year, political activities increased in their velocity, although officially campaigns had not started. Many rallies were being held by the major parties. Tension was rising, as each of the two major parties

concern for the unity and peace of Nigeria. Caritas Nigeria cashed in on the situation to organize rallies across the country on World Day of Peace. Caritas Nigeria advised as follows: Nigeria belongs to all of us, and we the citizens should determine the fate of politicians rather than allowing them to determine our fate. Let us pray and at least resolve as citizens that we shall not contribute in any way towards the realization of the negative predictions about our country Nigeria. This peaceful procession is an indication that we as citizens are ready to stand up for the peace and unity of our country.

Caritas Nigeria urged citizens to among other things: publicly embarrass any politician who wants to use them as instruments of violence; Come February 2015, go out en mass and vote, and not give room for politicians to mass-thump-print ballot papers; wait outside the perimeter fence and witness the public counting of votes at polling units and keep a record of the results; not restrict their votes to the two main opposing parties and vote for credible individuals in lesser known parties, especially at the presidential elections, as the two main opposing parties were ready to bring down the nation if neither of them won the presidential election. Finally Nigerians were urged to stop hate speech in the social media.

Later, as doubts and rumours filled the air with regards the intention of the ruling party to bring in an interim government rather than

displayed unbridled desperation. There was allow the elections to hold, Caritas Nigeria issued statements that were much publicized by the media. 'The 2015 elections mean a lot to Nigerians. A free and fair election will be an expression of the will of the people and the basis for a new Nigeria. Nigerians want to choose their own leaders, no matter the character of these leaders; Nigerians don't want a clique or a cartel to do this for them. If a free and fair election will affirm or change leadership at local government, state and federal levels, it will go a long way to instill the commitment to participation, accountability and transparency which are hallmarks of good governance. These elections must hold, and they must be free and fair, in order for political actors to have respect for the ordinary Nigerian and value our collective participation and sovereignty.

> As threats of violence became more and more palpable, Caritas Nigeria/JDPC advised Nigerians to know that politicians were all the same. If APC wins the presidential election, everyone will decamp there and if PDP wins, they will move back to PDP, so it is not worth it destroying property and or especially destroying lives just because one set of politicians have lost elections.

> Generally, Caritas Nigeria/JDPC have remained in the public consciousness as a vibrant agency of the Catholic Church in Nigeria. Caritas Nigeria Executive Director and program directors get invited to television programs to speak on current issues; Caritas Nigeria is also networking with other agencies and NGOs to always bring in the perspective of the Church.

PROVINCIAL REPORT AT A GLANCE

aritas Nigeria is structured to work at the National level. The Diocesan Justice Development and Peace/Caritas Commissions (JDPCs) are Caritas Nigeria's primary implementing partners, along with Health departments and health facilities of dioceses and religious congregations. The dioceses themselves are grouped into nine regional sub-coordinating bodies known as Ecclesiastical Provinces, which work with Caritas Nigeria national office to facilitate coordination. The 9 Ecclesiastical Provinces altogether subcoordinate fifty five dioceses, many with varied and same number of dioceses. The following are reports from some provinces for this reporting period.



ABUJA PROVINCE

Abuja Ecclesiastical Province is made up of the following Dioceses; Abuja, Gboko, Katsina Ala, Makurdi, Lokoja, Idah, Otukpo and Lafia.

The Provincial Office of Health and JDPC, Abuja Province is not a field implementing organ, rather it initiates actions that galvanize the Diocesan Offices of Health and JDPCs within Abuja Province, to function optimally and serves as a bridge between the Dioceses, in Abuja Province, and the National Office in strengthening platforms for information sharing and maintenance of quality assurance of programs/projects implemented by both Health and JDPC Commissions in the Dioceses.

In 2014, Abuja Provincial office of Health and JDPC carried-out the following activities which had impactful contributions to our Arch/Diocesan interventions;

a. **COORDINATORS' MEETINGS:** In the year under review three Coordinators' meetings were held. The meetings provided platform for experience sharing, notably, was dedication of one of the meetings to review SMILE project's guidelines and technically



supported Diocesan Commissions aspiring to be enlisted in the second phase of SMILE project. It is heartwarming to note that ten (10) Commissions of Health and JDPC in Abuja Province are presently involved in SMILE Project implementation. Five Commissions; JDPC Abuja, JDPC Lafia, JDPC Idah, JDPC Katsina-Ala and JDPC Gboko, were all enlisted in SMILE Project in 2014.

b. PULL-OUT OF ALL CONSTITUTENCY PROJECTS EARMARKED FOR STATES IN ABUJA PROVINCE FROM 2014 FEDERAL GOVERNMENT BUDGET:

The Provincial Office did a comprehensive pull-out of all social service sector projects earmarked for execution in 2014 across Communities in Abuja Province, the information was shared with the Diocesan Commissions of JDPC and Health. A total of 160 projects were identified from the budget which were to benefit Communities in Abuja Province. The breakdown of the identified projects for 2014 showed that; 19 projects

RESEARCH INTO THE IMMEDIATE c. AND REMOTE CAUSES OF **RESURGENCY OF CONFLICT IN ABUJA PROVINCE**: The resurgence of violent conflicts across five Diocese; Lafia, Makurdi, Otukpo, Gboko and Katsina-Ala got to its peak in 2013, which prompted the Provincial Bishops to direct the Provincial office of Health/JDPC to carry out a research with a view to establishing the immediate and Remote causes of the resurgence of conflict in the area. The research started in the last quarter of 2013 and concluded in the 1st quarter of 2014 with submission of comprehensive draft report to the Provincial Bishops and Coordinators. It is

However, 45 projects were chosen by our Diocesan Commissions for monitoring and tracking in 2014. To assist the Commissions to effectively monitor the projects, the Provincial office accessed quarterly disbursement information made in favour of the projects from Federal Ministry of Finance and Accountant General's office. The quarterly disbursement information aided the Diocesan Commissions in mobilizing other Stakeholders' interest in tracking the Constituency project implementation in their respective Arch/Dioceses.

d. DRAFT 5 YEARS STRATEGIC PLAN DOCUMENT FOR JDPC LOKOJA: We worked with Stakeholders of Lokoja Dioceses in developing a comprehensive five-year strategic plan (2015 – 2019). The strategic plan has since been adopted by all the Stakeholders, including the Diocesan Bishop.

e. DRAFT NEEDS ASSESSMENT FOR JDPC, IDAH: The Abuja Provincial Office of Health&JDPC facilitated the processes leading



to the development of a Needs Assessment Document for JDPC Idah Diocese in 2014.

f. PRODUCTION OF 2013 ANNUAL

REPORT OF H/JDPC, ABUJA PROVINCE: We continued in our organizational culture of producing our Annual Report. More so, in 2014 we produced our 2013 Annual Report which was a collation of activity reports of both Health and JDPCs across Eight Dioceses within Abuja Province and of course, it included reports of activities directly superintended by the Provincial Office.

BENIN PROVINCE

Benin province is made up of the following dioceses; Benin, Warri, Issele-Uku, Auchi and Uromi. In the course of 2014, the Province' development intervention activities which UROMIIDPCI focus on the Church's mission with regards to integral human development, justice and option for the poor are highlighted below;

BENIN IDPCI

- Capacity building on gender, conflict resolution and work plan development for staff and Diocesan Directors of JDPC in the province. 25 persons benefited 11 males and 14 females.
- Capacity building on proposal • development and writing. 21 persons benefited: 14 females, and 7 males.
- Health & HIV/AIDS; The Archdiocese conducted HIV test and counselling with the support of Edo SACA in 3 major communities Ologbo, Iguosa and Iguobazuwa. 240 persons were reached with HTC: 89 Males, 151 Females.
- Support for Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC); in collaboration with Ogbe Secondary School (Food bank project): Male 9, Female 10. Total 19 children and their care givers of Ogbe Secondary School benefitted from this project.
- Prison Apostolate; Inmates. Visiting and carrying out some welfare services assisting inmates who do not have legal representation. During this reporting period 1 female inmate who delivered a baby benefited from the support of the Archdiocesan prisons apostolate project.
- Saving Internal Lending • **Communities (SILC);** micro credit to uplift people above poverty level. The

project beneficiaries are selected 126 women in Benin Archdiocese.

Computer training institute to empower • voung people to reduce unemployment. In 2014, the scheme trained and graduated 4 young people and also admitted 12 students; 9 female 3 male for the next session.

- Good Governance; Community Mobilization and Capacity strengthening for Good Governance. 22 communities benefited from it Esan South East LGA and Igueben LGA. The project is funded by Misereor Anchen Germany.
- Health & HIV/AIDS; promoting healthy living at the grassroots, through the integration of HIV/AIDS services. Sensitization activities were carried out and about 62,075 have been reached with sensitization messages while 160 persons who tested positive have been reached with care and support service in Esan North East L.G.A.
- **Prisons Apostolate:** There were several visitations to Ubiaja prison to provide psychological and legal counseling for inmates. So far. 22 families were visited on behalf of the inmates and some food items like rice, garri, 40 tubers of yams were given to inmates.
- **Promoting Micro Enterprise** (PROMIC) PROMIC I and II and individual lending scheme; The PROMIC 1 & 2 has empowered a total number of 194 and 210 less privileged and active women of Uromi Diocese. 60 other individuals supported by the lending scheme.
- The Livelihood Desk promotes skill acquisition and training for out of school vulnerable children and young active care-givers. The skills acquisition contract and empowerment program empowered 11 persons and supported 48 persons to start up different trades.

- Sustainable Mechanism for Improving Livelihoods and Household Empowerment (SMILE) project: A project that focuses on the well being of vulnerable children and their households in 4 communities; lvue, Eror, Obeidu, and Ebele in Esan land. So far, 25 care-givers have been empowered; household and vulnerable children have been enrolled as beneficiaries of this project. SMILE is a USAID funded project with Catholic R elief Services as the lead implementing partner.

- Scholarship award initiative to underprivileged children. Five primary school pupils are beneficiaries of this scheme, 4 females and 1 male.

- Good Governance: The project trained and sensitized people on their electoral rights and the need to go out and vote for their preferred candidates. The project was implement in 4 Local Government Areas; Etsako Central, Etsako West, Etsako East, and Owan East.
- Roll back malaria program to sensitize people on how they can prevent malaria. Some communities Azukhala, Udaba,Ogbe, Iviari, in Etsako East LGA and Aloko LGA benefited from this project.
- Sustaining livelihoods: Selected widows and indigent persons from 2

communities (Iyerekhu and Ugiekha) in Auchi were beneficiaries of this project. The sum of 20,000 to 35,000 naira was given to the beneficiaries.

•Sustainable Mechanism for

Improving Livelihoods and Household Empowerment (SMILE); the SMILE project is also being implemented by Auchi Diocese. So far, vulnerable households and children in 3 villages in Akoko Edo LGA, Enwan and Damgbala all in Akoko Edo LGA are beneficiaries of the project.

CALABAR PROVINCE

Calabar Province is made up of the following Dioceses; Calabar, Ogoja, Ikot Ekpene, Uyo, and Port-Harcourt. The year 2014 witnessed quite a few new initiatives in programing as against past years. However, JDP/Caritas Calabar maintained and cascaded our existing development project from 2013 to 2014 notably:

PROMIC SWISSHAND

PROMIC Project is one focused on poverty reduction through Micro – Credit for rural women for self-sufficiency, noting that poverty affects women most in the rural communities.

The project kicked off November 2012 with an initial release of N 1.3 Million only.

PROMIC project served the first 50 (fifty) recipients in February 2013.

By 2014 JDP/Caritas Calabar received 6.8

Million in total and we are reaching about 300 (three hundred) rural women with Micro – Credit in Atimbo, Akpap (in Akpabuyo) Efut Abua, Ikot Omin, Ikot Edem Odo, Ikot Ansa & Ekpene Tete.

United Cement Company – Peace Building Project

The Justice Development and Peace/Caritas is partnering with UNICEM in their Corporate Social

Responsibily efforts through Peace Building in the host communities of UNICEM Plant, notably Mfamosing, Abiati, Mbobui, Akwa Ikot Effanga, Akansoko and Ekonganaku.

JDP/Caritas Calabar facilitated the formation of Community Trust Committees by developing constitutions and registration of the CTCs with the relevant government regulating bodies.

The CTC is supported to implement community projects with funds provided by UNICEM – this is done to reduce youth restiveness and destruction of UNICEM properties. Through the support of JDP/Caritas Calabar – indigent youths have educational support from UNICEM as part of their Corporate Social Responsibilities.

The project is on-going, it is estimated to cost N 3.5 Million yearly.

Policy Advocacy – Support to Cross River SACA JDP/Caritas Calabar support to Cross River SACA: In 2014, JDP/Caritas sitting as Chairman Policy and Advocacy



Technical Working Group (TWG) supported Policy Briefs for increase in SACA funding for HIV/AIDS intervention by the Cross River State government. The advocacy was successful and there was an increased from N 100,000,000 (Hundred Million Naira) to N 300,000,000 (Three Hundred Million Naira only) for funding of HIV/AIDS program by the state government.

There was also support in developing the Work plan Policy in Cross River State and while supporting the establishment of Local Authority for the Control of AIDS (LACA) in the 18 Local Government Areas of Cross River State.

USAID, HIFASS/CAACA-OVC Program

Local Orphans and Vulnerable Children Partnership Initiative in Nigeria (LOPIN) Region 3 (LOPIN 3): It is a five year program with the overall goal of mitigating the impact of HIV/AIDS on children and families. The project is implemented in Cross River and Ebonyi States. The program uses a tri-focus approach of Community engagement, delivery of Comprehensive care and Support services to OVC and capacity development for Local Organization for better management system of OVC in Cross River State.

JDP/Caritas, through our sister organization – Calabar Archdiocesan Action Committee on

AIDS (CAACA) signed a Teaming Agreement with Health Initiative for Safety and Stability in Africa (HIFASS) for the LOPIN 3 program. The program is funded by USAID.

JDP/Caritas Port-Harcourt

The followings are achievements of the Port-harcourt Diocese in 2014;

- 2014 Lenten launched the Lenten Guide.
- Intervention to flood victims; the dioceses supported flood victims in Ahoada, Omoku and Ndoni communities
- Prisons Welfare Service; JDPC Portharcourt donated 65 pieces of mattresses to Port-harcourt Prison and also supported the renovation of Degema Prison roof.
- Seminar/interactive section with Rivers State INEC; we conducted a successful interactive session with INCE on upcoming 2015 elections preparation.

Conducted the Right of the Child Seminar aimed at educating and enlightening parents, care givers and all on the rights of children.

IBADAN PROVINCE

Ibadan Province comprises six dioceses namely: Ibadan, Oyo, Osogbo, Ondo, Ilorin and Ekiti.

The JDP Coordinators of the province meet at least six times in a year and are also well represented at various meetings and programs at the national level. Training of staff which is one of the important tools for skill acquisition and empowerment for effective services is not

DEMOCRACY AND HUMAN RIGHTS PROGRAMME

Human Right

The program which runs across the dioceses of the province focuses on advocacy and lobbying to achieve greater impact on the life of its targets. The legal aid program is committed to increasing the knowledge of all people on issues of human rights and civic duties.

The Legal Aid program continues to offer assistance to prisoners and members of the public through representation in court, both in

and this has yielded an encouraging result as it proved to be successful and the groups and individuals who benefited from it were largely satisfied with its outcome. A specialized seminar was organized in favour of prisons decongestion. The program treated speedy Administration of justice and how to decongest Prison by promoting Alternative Dispute Resolution.

JDP and the Media: The organization engages the media for wide dissemination of its many interventions; this has raised the level of Awareness and active participation of the



Civil and criminal cases. Bails applications filed to ensure the right to liberty to some awaiting trial prisoners. Awareness on issues of civil rights is created through advocacy visits and lectures, symposia etcetera.

Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR)

It has been noticed that issues of conflict that ensue between parties and individuals are usually issues that could be settled out of court and since this is possible, it will contribute to having less number of cases to deal with in the court, unnecessary detention of persons at the police stations and also bridging factions and establishing a cordial relationship among individuals. To this end, we have taken to the ADR method in handling issues of this nature populace with very commendable involvement in the radio program. Numerous activities under the media as undertaken by the JDP within this period of reporting include, half an hour weekly slots on radio stations in which various issues to holistic human development are discussed. In this program, burning issues within the society are discussed by experts and listeners are allowed to air their views through phone calls. The program so far

has a wide audience capacity.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

JDP intervention focuses also on the training of peasant farmers (men, women, and youths) on organic agriculture to improve their livelihood and the environment. Rural Development program, works with farmers and villagers in the remote communities where government intervention has been weak and sometimes almost not felt at all. The mission is to have a group of farmers and community development committees that are empowered to attract benefits from all relevant agents on Rural Development and Agriculture.

KADUNA PROVINCE

Kaduna Province consists of the following Dioceses; Kaduna, Kano, Sokoto, Minna, Kontagora, Kafanchan and Zaria.

The following are some of the activities and programs undertaken by the Province during this reporting period;

• NIGERIA STABILITY AND RECONCILIATION PROGRAM (NSRP)

Northern Nigeria has generally been a cultural and religious sensitive environment for a long time now. Even with the promotion of gender equality. However with the return to democracy in 1999, the religious dimension has become more prominent with greater agitation for women participation in all economic issues and the need to get them better education. All these conflicts and economic instability, with strong impact on the vulnerable necessitates the intervention of the British Council managed project Nigeria Stability and Reconciliation Program (NSRP).

Justice Development Peace Caritas Advocate (JDPCA) Kano, working in partnership with Federation of Muslim Women Association of Nigeria (FOMWAN), and Jamaltu Nasril Islami (JNI), Women's Wing is implementing an output of the project that is targeted at Security and Governance with specific focus on community peace building. The subproject titled;

Community Peace Building Project For The Promotion Of Peace, Security And Stability In Kano State; is aimed at reducing the impacts of inter and intra communal violent conflicts as well as improved internal and external relationship between communities and security stakeholders in 3 LGAs of Kano State namely; Doguwa, Bichi and Kumbotso LGAs.

• ADVOCACY CAMPAIGN ON C O M B A T I N G L A B O U R EXPLOITATION OF STREET CHILDREN BEGGARS TO DE-ESCALATE INSECURITY IN KANO STATE, NORTH-WEST NIGERIA: The *overall objective* of this project is to address the *Almajiri* situation; a subset of street children found principally in the northern states of Nigeria. It aims to reduce their exposure to violence and anti-social behaviors, thus contributing to reduction of insecurity ravaging the northern part of Nigeria.

The project investigates and documents the number of Almajiris and the linkages with violence in Nigeria's north; advocates for peace and reform of key institutions and processes in the region; establish essential and detailed particulars of the social conditions of the Almajiri and of the abuse of their child-rights in

the Almajiri education system in Kano State.

The project had all stakeholders adopt a policy document expressing agreement to end the labour-exploitation of the Almajiri and other abuse of their rights, improved enforcement of the law of Kano State on labourexploitation of the Almajiri and other abuses of their rights

The **output** of the project is a research-based report on the conditions of the Almajiris, their exploitation, and other abuses of

their rights; a policy document adopted by the stakeholders (or their representative organizations) on the rights of the Almajiri; Judicial cases in enforcement of the Kano State law outlawing the exploitation of the Almajiri.

The project is a partnership between the Justice, Development and Peace Commission (JDPC) and Resource Centre for Human Rights and Civic Education (CHRICED). It is an 18 months project that started in September 2014 and will end in February, 2016.

• AGRICULTURAL PROJECT: TRAIL PROJECT WITH AFRICAN RICE

& CRS: JDPA is currently implementing the Trail Project in 3 local government areas namely; Bunkure, Kura and Garun Mallam. The objective is to use a software known as Nutrient Manger for Rice to analyze the data gathered from farmers so as to advice key stakeholders to increase their learning on sustainable and improved rice production for higher yield. The project also evaluates Fertilizer guideline obtained from NMR relative to farmers fertilizer management practice and current recommendation practice. 20 farmers are beneficiaries of this project.

- Strengthened Research work that will hopefully place JDPCA in more strategic position in the CSO community and with International Partners

- Over 100 direct beneficiaries ranging from technology transfer to in-depth capacity building.
- Over 1,000 indirect beneficiaries gained from the trials in Kano.
- Strengthened relationship among the various participating stakeholders.
- Public, private and non-governmental linkages created better enhanced Rice value chain development.

DPC KADUNA

- Good Governance: The JDPC good governance project is geared towards human rights issues. The project provides access to justice and empowering community justice system.
- **Micro-credit and Livelihoods:** This project provides access to micro credit facilities for rural women to improve

their livelihoods.

• The diocese also carried out sensitization campaigns in communities aimed at creating awareness on matters of civic responsibility and rights.

Key achievements

- Community justice system in place
- Interventions are spread across communities in the six Deanery and beneficiaries are selected based on need.
- Marginalized persons have access to free and fair justice.

ONITSHA PROVINCE

Onitsha Province is made up of the following Dioceses: Onitsha, Enugu, Nnewi, Nsukka, Awka, Abakaliki and Awgu, across three states; Anambra, Enugu and Abakiliki. The following reports covers the entire locations mentioned above.

The Justice Development and Peace Commission (JDPC) Onitsha within the year under review has engaged in several activities geared toward realization of its mission of integral development of human person through a holistic empowerment approach. JDPC activities in the year 2014 revolve around the 3

out of 6 areas of focus which include;

- Democracy and Good governance
- Economic and Social Reforms
- Caritas

DEMOCRACY AND GOOD GOVERNANCE PROGRAM AREA

Strengthened 32 community institutions capacity to engage duty bearers and demand their rights: Under the Voice to the people project, JDPC Onitsha has

supported activities that tend to increase rural community knowledge of rights. More than 2,500 community members and leaders were reached with training on rights and advocacy

within the year. This has promoted the process of rights claiming across 8 LGAs in Anambra State.

• Increased participation of 100 women in rural community decision making organs

Using targeted advocacy and learning among women traditional institutions such as Umuada, women wing of the Town Unions and others, about 100 women has been elevated within the year 2014 to be part of community decision making. Space has been created for 24 women and 3 women in Umuoba-Anam and Nando communities respectively to join traditional rulers' cabinet. This was possible due to negotiation meetings and training /information provided by JDPC Onitsha targeting traditional authorities and community women.

• JDPC Onitsha introduced new demand tool 'community demand charter'

JDPC Onitsha as a way of promoting demandside governance has supported more than 40 communities in Anambra State to develop citizen demand charters containing

• 210 JDPC Onitsha Volunteers were trained on Hospital Monitoring and Evaluation

In order to improve the standard of services in the Primary and Secondary health facilities across the State, JDPC Onitsha has trained 210 animators to support the monitoring activities. They were provided with monitoring tools to be used to make quarterly reports which will be forwarded to the Commissioner for Health who made strong commitment to partner with the commission.

Other program activities conducted under the Democracy and Good Governance program includes;



community prioritized needs. More than 72 demand charters were developed with the year and were further used to engage the budget process at both LG and State levels.

• Mobilized Stakeholders to Promote Tax Justice

More than 120 Stakeholders have been mobilized by JDPC Onitsha to support advocacy to discourage multiple and double taxation in Anambra State. 2 Public dialogue sessions were organized with FIRS and tax payers and a communiqué issued and shared/distributed across the State. Special Sunday mass was also organized on the Tax Justice.

- 300 voter education facilitators trained and deployed to support voter education and information/awareness creation across the Archdiocese
- Sensitization to form JDPC in 17 additional parishes
- 8 Local Government Areas (LGAs) supported to develop Budget Implementation Strategy. This is to be used in 2015 Local Government Budget implementation.
- Budget Forum organized in 8 Local Government Areas where 51 community demand charters were presented to be included in the 2015 Budget.

- 58 Ward Councillors trained on quality representation – This has improved the Councilors' level of representation in the Local Government Legislative Council.
- 2 rounds scorecard processes conducted in 5 service sectors (Education, Health, Agriculture, Infrastructure and water and sanitation) and used evidence to make formal request from relevant government agencies.
- Intensive mapping exercise conducted across 82 Parishes to build a comprehensive list of credible election observers with album. About 1300



observers have been identified. This makes it easier to supply observers whenever the need be.

- Organized forum to standardize the process of logging-in of human right abuses the forum was organized to link communities with agencies that promote and protect human rights.
- Introduced JDPC Hour a live Radio Listeners Program to discuss issues of rights, advocacy and learning.
- Periodic Information sharing with the priests and laity on Community Engagement, Governance and advocacy.

• Support to 17 Civil Society groups to build their capacities on organizational development and networking.

Networking: JDPC has a network of partners at International, National, State and Local levels. These include the Department for International Development (DFiD), Christian Aid (CA), Centre for Leadership and Strategic Development (C-LSD), Civil Rights Concern (CRC), Development in Practise (DiP), and a host of community articulated partners like Community Empowerment Network (COMEN), Community Based Monitors (CBO's) who work collectively for a better society. This enables JDPC to continually liaise

> with the 32 communities that it works in at Anambra State in diverse areas of activities while mainstreaming participatory monitoring & evaluation. JDPC Onitsha has strong relationship with National Human Right Commission (NHRC), NAPTIP, Ministry of Women Affairs and National Orientation Agency (NOA).

ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL JUSTICE/EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMAREA

The Promoting Micro-enterprises (PROMIC) is divided into three levels PROMIC 1, 2, 3;

Promic 1

JDPC Onitsha operates 3 PROMIC programs: PROMIC 1; PROMIC 2 and Agric PROMIC. The 3 programs have received over N3m each and have turned in large amounts of money which have covered the costs of the program as can be testified by the reports sent to SWISSHAND. This has given women new lease of life through enhanced agricultural activities, economic empowerment activities and soft loans since its inception in 2010. More importantly, PROMIC in Onitsha has disbursed loan to over 1200 women and still counting. and Oyi Local Government Areas. Others JDPC (ICRAM) project partners. in the upland communities are in Idemili North, Idemili South and Ihiala LGAs

Promic 2

The JDPC Onitsha- PROMIC scheme has typically helped women establish new micro and small businesses, expand plantation. The fund is being recycled, Department. thereby accommodating and increasing the total number of beneficiaries. Interestingly, PROMIC fund has been re-disbursed in Mmiata-Anam community more than 5 times, Umuoba-Anam 7 times, Anaku 3 times, Nnado 3 times, Umueri 2 times, Atani 5 times, Atani 4 times, Ossomala 3 times, etc. PROMIC is thriving because the loan schedule is convenient and viable unlike the loan system in their villages where 100% of the money borrowed is paid back in bulk.

Promic Agric 3

This is being implemented in five (5) communities of Anambra State presently with 141 women benefiting.

- 2.1. poorest of the poor LGAs in Anambra with Archbishop Val. Okeke support fund/program titled Catholic Archdiocese of Onitsha Micro-Credit Support - CADOMICS
- 2.2. **Empowerment** – At least 10 applicants have benefited in JDPC new Job Outsourcing Program. Transport empowerment using KEKE NAPEP has been introduced. 2 persons have gotten tricycles. Seventy persons received training on job ethics and morality in the work place

2.3. **Improving** Community Response to Management Malaria (ICRAM)

This project covers Aguata Local Government Area only. Aguata Local

2.4. School Run

The JDPC Onitsha School Run program has benefited more than 60 school children. The scheme is introduced to help parents reduce the burden of taking the children to and fro school. Over 1,200 indigent persons in 3 This has helped to reduce the incidence of Okada accident faced by children in the town.

JDPC Lenten Campaign: 2.5.

Lenten Campaign was carried out in 7 Parishes within the year. JDPC Market Lenten campaign drive was also conducted in 5 major markets; Main market, Ochanja market, Electronics market and New/Old tyre market

Activity Area 3; Caritas

- JDPC disbursed about N600,000.00 on 3.1. Charity, Bursary and Medical assistance within the year. More than 60 persons benefited
- Valentine Day celebrated with more 3.2. than 150 motherless babies in Onitsha Motherless babies home and environs.

3.3. Provision of education materials such as school bags, textbooks, exercise books and other learning aids for 50 indigent primary school children in Odoakpu area of Onitsha
