

2024: A YEAR IN REVIEW



For over a decade, the Catholic Bishops Conference of Nigeria (CBCN) entrusted the Catholic Caritas Foundation of Nigeria (Caritas Nigeria) with the mission of serving as the humanitarian arm of the Church, and also serve as a beacon of hope to the most vulnerable in society. In fulfilling this mandate, Caritas Nigeria has remained steadfast in addressing societal challenges, ensuring that those in need receive timely and impactful support. Through strategic interventions and unwavering commitment, the organization has continued to be a guiding light, transforming lives and strengthening communities across the nation.

Despite the undeniable challenges of 2024, including economic hardships, a surge in fuel prices, rising inflation, insecurity in various regions, and

the lingering effects of climate change, Caritas Nigeria remained resolute in its commitment to sustainable development and humanitarian action. These challenges exacerbated vulnerabilities across communities, making access to basic needs, healthcare, and livelihood opportunities even more difficult. HEALTH

aritas Nigeria's current health interventions focus on providing comprehensive HIV/AIDS prevention, treatment, care, and support services to individuals and communities in Abia, Enugu, and Imo States.

Working with service delivery facilities, community-based organizations, and Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) pick-up sites, we provide HIV testing services, lifesaving treatment, and socioeconomic and psychosocial support services to people living with HIV (PLHIV), and institutional capacity strengthening to HIV management personnel

DEPLOYING AN UMBRELLA GRANTS MECHANISM (UGM), WE SUB-GRANT SERVICE DELIVERY FACILITIES (SDFS), ART PICK-UP SITES, AND COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS (CBOS) TO IDENTIFY, ENROLL, AND DELIVER QUALITY HIV CARE SERVICES TO DESERVING CLIENTS, INCLUDING ORPHANS AND VULNERABLE CHILDREN, INTHE SOCIETY.

To improve health outcomes in communities, we also offer adequate tuberculosis prevention and treatment services in Abia, Bayelsa, Ebonyi, Enugu, and Imo States.

ACCESS PROJECT

The Accelerated Control of HIV Epidemic and Sustainability Solution (ACCESS) Project is funded by the United States President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and implemented in Abia, Enugu, and Imo States.



N-THRIP PROJECT

Caritas Nigeria is currently implementing the Nigeria TB-HIV Reach, Integration, and Impact Project (N-THRIP) Global Cycle 7 (GC7) project as a sub-recipient to the Institute of Human Virology Nigeria (IHVN) – the principal recipient of the grant. The GC7 project, which spans from January 2024 to December 2026, is focused on ensuring early diagnosis of TB and HIV and providing comprehensive care for affected individuals. The project is implemented in Abia, Bayelsa, Ebonyi, Enugu, and Imo States


EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND HUMANITARIAN SERVICES

The Emergency Response and Humanitarian Services thematic area has made significant strides in delivering impactful interventions to vulnerable communities across Nigeria, particularly in Borno, Adamawa, and Yobe States. With a focus on addressing urgent humanitarian needs, the Unit has implemented projects funded by major donors, aiming to improve food security, water, sanitation, hygiene (WASH), protection, health, nutrition, and livelihoods. These efforts reflect a commitment to enhancing the quality of life and dignity of affected populations while addressing systemic challenges through community-driven and evidence-based approaches.

FOOD SECURITY AND HUMANITARIAN PROTECTION FOR VICTIMS OF THE LAKE CHAD CRISIS

Funded by the German Federal Foreign Office (GFFO) through Caritas Germany, the Food Security and Humanitarian Protection for Victims of the Lake Chad Crisis Project adopts a consortium approach to mitigate conflict-related food insecurity and enhance protection for vulnerable groups in the Lake Chad region, with a focus on Borno State. It strives to improve living conditions and restore dignity for those affected by persistent armed conflict, employing a combination of cash transfers and in-kind assistance.

In partnership with the Justice Development and Peace Commission (JDPC) of the Catholic Diocese of Maiduguri,

Caritas Nigeria implements this intervention to provide safe water, promote hygiene practices, and reduce disease transmission Implemented in Gwoza, Kaga and Magumeri Local Government Areas

Key Achievements

- Registration of 5,058 households (HHs) and cash disbursement to 3,737 HHs.
- Distribution of agricultural inputs to 3,000 participants.
- Scale-up of disbursement rates to 70% of the Minimum Expenditure Basket (MEB).
- Production of visibility materials for enhanced community engagement.

COMPREHENSIVE HUMANITARIAN, EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND ECONOMIC RECOVERY FOR SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS (CHEERS-Flex)

In the year under review, Caritas Nigeria received funds from the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs through Caritas Norway to implement the Comprehensive Humanitarian, Emergency Response and Economic Recovery for Sustainable Livelihoods (CHEERS-Flex), which aimed to save lives, alleviate suffering, and protect human dignity in Adamawa and Borno States, Nigeria

Targeting 3,400 households (17,000 individuals) affected by conflict.

Key Achievements

- 1,468 HHs received cash transfers while 1,400 HHs were trained in climate-smart agriculture.
- 10,640 individuals screened, with 415 severe acute malnutrition cases referred for treatment.
- 4,424 individuals were reached with GBV information and 372 survivors were provided with livelihoods.
- 12,095 individuals participating in hygiene promotion. Also, 9 boreholes were rehabilitated.
- 1,657 HHs joined Savings and Internal Lending Communities (SILC) while 440 women were trained in vocational skills.

RAPID RESPONSE FUND

With funding support from the International Organization for Migration (IOM), Caritas Nigeria implemented the Rapid Response Fund (RRF) project, which sought to address the acute emergency resulting from the displacement of households.

To address the acute emergency resulting from the displacement of about 5,302 households

Caritas Nigeria provided emergency Multi-purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA) through community involvement and stakeholder engagement The project reached the target populations in households. in Damask town, Mobbar LGA of Borno State over three (3) months

Key Achievements

- Provision of cash assistance to 1,753 beneficiaries through e-wallets, with plans to reach an additional 3,549 beneficiaries subsequently.
- Formation of 3 Community Project Implementation Committees (CPICs) to enhance community involvement.

SCALING UP ASSISTANCE IN HARD-TO-REACH AREAS (SAHARA)

The SAHaRA project, funded by the European Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations (ECHO) through Caritas Germany, sought to provide inclusive, safe, and dignified access to immediate humanitarian, food, and WASH assistance to the most vulnerable internally displaced persons (IDP) and host communities.

With a target of 2,367 HHs (14,200 individuals), the intervention aimed to strengthen community resilience in hard-to-reach areas

The approach was community-based and participatory, seeking the empowerment of project participants, rebuilding their lives after an emergency hit, and collaborating with faith leaders to spread essential prevention messages in vulnerable communities.

- Distribution of 807 menstrual hygiene kits and 634 cholera kits.
- Training of 34 hygiene promoters and construction of VIP latrines to improve sanitation.

INFORMATION MANAGEMENT SERVICES FOR IMPROVED EVIDENCE-BASED HUMANITARIAN INTERVENTIONS IN BORNO, ADAMAWA, AND YOBE STATES

In the year under review, Caritas Nigeria was funded by the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UNOCHA) through the Nigeria Humanitarian Fund (NHF) to provide information management services for improved evidence-based humanitarian interventions in Borno, Adamawa, and Yobe States, from January 2024 – January 2025.

Working with other humanitarian partners in Northeast Nigeria, Caritas Nigeria conducted a thematic area needs assessment to generate data The data was analyzed and shared with the Humanitarian Country Team (HCT) The HCT comprises representatives from the UN, IOM, international NGOs, the Red Cross/Red Crescent Movement, and other humanitarian partners

Key Achievements

- Conducted assessments in 62 LGAs, supporting 82 organizations with Sector Needs and Risk Assessment (SNRA).
- Conducted a WASH infrastructure sweep in Adamawa State and lean season assessment in Dikwa, informed planning, as well as GIS technologyenhanced data collection in inaccessible areas.

DRY SEASON FARMING PROGRAM

The 4-month project Food and Agriculture (FAO), which commenced in November 2024, aimed to support subsistence farmers in Song, Mubi North, and Madagali LGAs of Adamawa State with seedlings and other farm inputs to increase their household economic stability



BRIDGING THE GAP IN NUTRITIONAL SERVICES AND STRENGTHENING COMMUNITIES TO BUILD RESILIENCE FOR POSITIVE NUTRITIONAL OUTCOMES

The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) partnered with Caritas Nigeria to contribute to Nigeria's achievement of nutrition sector strategic priorities by reducing the spread of acute malnutrition among pregnant women, lactating mothers, and children (0-59 months old) in Shani LGA of Borno State.

The intervention aimed to enhance the access of the target groups to effective malnutrition prevention services. It also improved the treatment of severe acute malnutrition (SAM) cases in stabilization centres (SC) and Outpatient Treatment Programs

Key Achievements

- The project surpassed its targets, training 4,357 caregivers on complementary food preparation.
- 3,831 children and 2,615 women were screened for malnutrition, admitting 592 children to SCs, with a 98.5% cure rate.
- MIYCN initiatives reached 4,327 participants through cooking demonstrations.



PROTECTION AND MIGRATION

▶aritas Nigeria through her Protection and Migration Unit has → made significant strides in delivering impactful interventions to refugees (mostly Cameroonians), host communities and returnee migrants across Nigeria, particularly in Cross River, Borno, Adamawa, and Yobe States. With a focus on addressing urgent humanitarian needs of these target population. The projects the Unit has implemented were majorly funded by UNHCR and ERAC, aiming to protect the target group and improve access to justice, legal documentation, food security, health/medical care, nutrition, and livelihoods. These efforts reflect a commitment to enhancing the quality of life and dignity of affected populations while addressing systemic challenges through community-driven and evidence-based approaches.

Protection and Migration Sectors of Intervention

1.Protection: Ensuring community sensitization on rights and entitlements, protection against sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA), and addressing gender-based violence (GBV).

1.Anti-Human Trafficking: Ensuring that at risk population within the implementing states are sensitized on the ills of child trafficking and irregular migration.

1.Access to Justice: Provision of both in and out of court legal representation to refugees.

1.Referral services: Provision of appropriate referral pathways to the refugees to access services.

1.Food Security and Livelihoods: Provision of cash assistance, agricultural inputs, and capacitybuilding for farming activities to mitigate food insecurity and enhance livelihoods.

1. Protection and Assistance of Cameroonian Refugees (Cross River and Edo State):

10,997 were reached with GBV awareness-raising campaigns.

43 Anti-Human Trafficking (AHT) clubs were strengthened.

149 participants (including UNHCR staff, partner workforce, and government authorities) were trained to increase their GBV knowledge and skills in GBV prevention and response.

651 at-risk children received case management.

Best interest processes were initiated for 577 (308 females and 269 males).

292 project participants received legal assistance/advice (113 females and 179 males).

311 Persons with Specific Needs (PSN) were identified for assistance.

In collaboration with the National Population Commission, 1,017 refugees (517 females and 500 males) were assisted with civil documentation.

The goal was to awaken Nigerians' consciousness of Lake Chad's shrinking nature and promote plastic-waste-to-wealth initiatives, thus reducing its reduction.

As part of its objectives, the activity entailed carrying out a digital analysis of the various phases and changes occurring in the Lake Chad basin from 1982 till date and the various factors contributing to these changes to help drive policy, planning, and programmes for its restoration.







Integrative Solutions for Humanitarian Housing Support project

1. Goal

Provision of temporary housing and comprehensive support for ecological refugees and internally displaced persons (IDPs) in Bayelsa and Adamawa states, respectively.

2. Description

The Integrative Solutions for Humanitarian Housing Support project, funded by the Citi Foundation, is aimed at providing secure, dignified, and sustainable housing solutions for vulnerable populations across Nigeria; by integrating shelter initiatives with Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WaSH), livelihoods, and durable solutions to displacement. This intervention is a two-year initiative that will promote holistic human development and self-reliance among marginalized communities in Adamawa and Bayelsa States, Nigeria. The project, which started in September 2024, has conducted its preliminary activities such as advocacy meetings and stakeholder engagements with different persons and groups including the Bishop of Bomadi Diocese, the Bishop of Yola Diocese, and relevant government agencies across Adamawa and Bayelsa States.

3. Key Achievements

- In securing the Citi Foundation funding for Integrative Solutions for Humanitarian Housing Support in Adamawa and Bayelsa States, Caritas Nigeria, through the Environment Unit, gained national visibility and automatic membership of Charities Aid Foundation of America (CAF), affording the organization futuristic US funding opportunities.
- The National Catholic Tree-Growing Program: From the previous 45,420 trees planted across 17 dioceses, the CBCN, Caritas Nigeria and 42 dioceses have now planted 217,597 trees.
- Replacing tree seedlings that did not survive among the 33 trees planted by the CBCN at the Catholic Secretariat of Nigeria, monitoring and nursing the young trees as needed.
- Caritas Nigeria Environment interventions gained increased visibility and collaboration via presentations of their research findings on the times and fortunes of Lake Chad/plastic waste-to-wealth initiative presented on World Environment Day 2024.

4. Best Practice/Lessons learnt

- Engaging the local community in projects supports sustainability
- Timely and adequate planning ensures sound outputs and outcomes
- Proper mapping/consultation with relevant key stakeholders is paramount for effectiveness and efficiency in results (for example on the type and nature of trees planted at the Catholic Secretariat of Nigeria.
- The involvement and active participation of all relevant stakeholders in Caritas Nigeria facilitated the process of proposal writing for the Citi Foundation funding.

Key Achievements


- i Training of 6,400 farmers in climate-smart agriculture and subsequent provision of agricultural inputs like seeds, cassava stems, and fertilizers to enhance productivity.
- ii Distribution of homestead gardening inputs to 1,820 female-headed households.
- iii Distribution of energy-efficient cookstoves to 2,500 households to reduce environmental degradation and health risks.
- iv Training of 1,800 beneficiaries in trades like hairdressing, carpentry, and tailoring, among others. Each participant received start-up kits, enabling immediate income generation and economic self-reliance.
- v Establishment of 56 Savings and Internal Lending Communities (SILC) groups, further supporting financial inclusion, with twelve million naira (N12,000,000) saved collectively by 1,153 members.
- vi Training of 1,300 households in animal husbandry and subsequent support with resources like piglets and poultry to diversify their income streams.

BEST PRACTICE

- Active community engagement throughout project implementation. Financial literacy training of project participants.
- Effective collaboration with local trainers to ensure relevance and sustainability.

Activities Implemented

- •The AEJ-WAY Project in Plateau State, funded by CAFOD, focused on mainstreaming women and youth in public policy decisions.
- •The Africa Inclusive Economic Recovery Campaign (AIERC), funded by Jubilee USA through Caritas Africa, promoted responsible borrowing and lending in Nigeria.
- Establishment of Parish JDPC in Minna Diocese.
- •Training of 15 new directors of JDPC.
- Hosting of the JDPC Directors Annual General Meeting (AGM).
- Needs Assessment in Otukpo Diocese.

Key Achievements

- AEJ-WAY project workshops in Jos focused on leadership, advocacy, and addressing Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV), fostering political awareness and social cohesion.
- Workshops for faith-based leaders in four dioceses built advocacy skills for responsible borrowing and accountability.
- Needs assessment conducted in the Diocese of Otukpo.

Innovations/Best Practices/Lessons Learnt

- Women and youth mobilized communities in two LGAs to organize the first-ever political debate for local council chairmen aspirants, advocating for greater inclusion of women and youth in local governance.
- A Standard Operation Manual for the establishment of JDPC capillary units has been produced and presented to JDPC Directors.
- Intentional peacebuilding and conflict resolution efforts are important in implementation as conflict-affected people have demonstrated an eagerness to rebuild their communities.

Next Steps

- Partner with the JDPC of Jos Archdiocese and Pankshin Diocese to set up a trauma centre for survivors of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) in Plateau State under the AEJ-WAY Project.
- Design an implementation framework for strengthening the Diocese of Otukpo.
- Implement a community participation intervention in local government administration.

INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY STRENGTHENING



he Institutional Capacity Strengthening (ICS) thematic area aims to enhance the operational capabilities of Catholic Church organizations in Nigeria to address the needs of underserved populations effectively.

This thematic area focuses on improving organizational systems by building capacities to reduce waste and enhance efficiency, program implementation, and management through self-assessment, action planning, and capacity-building.

Through these programs, Caritas Nigeria aimed to ensure that diocesan Caritas agencies, the Justice Development and Peace Commission (JDPC), initiate and implement impactful development actions.

In the year under review, several activities were carried out to enhance the capacity of Catholic Church institutions to respond to emergencies and development challenges.

Institutional Capacity Strengthening Activities

- 1. Strengthening of Staff Capacity through PMD Pro Training
 - To improve project oversight and coordination as well as address performance gaps in the programs and projects implemented by Caritas Nigeria across several states, staff were equipped with essential project management tools and professional methodologies, enhancing program implementation efficiency.
 - The training covered project cycle management, stakeholder engagement, adaptive planning, resource optimization, accountability, and global best practices.
- 2. Collaboration to Enhance Access to Justice through the AEJ-WAY Project
 - Caritas Nigeria, through the ICS Unit, facilitated diocesan efforts in securing grants for the Accessible

- and Equitable Justice for Women and Youth (AEJ-WAY) project, funded by CAFOD.
- This initiative advances justice for marginalized communities by promoting strategic partnerships and strengthening advocacy efforts.
- 3. Capacity Strengthening Sessions for the Dioceses of Awgu and Wukari
 - Caritas Nigeria organized a series of training on Resource Mobilization, Financial Management, Human Resource Management, Safeguarding, and Project Cycle Management (PCM).
 - These sessions sought to introduce sustainable funding strategies, promote financial discipline, enhance staff management and organizational growth, advocate for the protection of at-risk populations, and equip staff of the dioceses with the skills to execute projects effectively.
- Disbursement of Seed Grants
 - · Each diocese received a two-

- million-naira (2,000,000) seed grant to apply project management skills and address community needs.
- The Diocese of Wukari, for instance, implemented a WASH project that cholera risks, gaining national and international recognition.
- 5. Development of Finance, HR and Safeguarding Policies
 - In response to identified policy gaps, comprehensive finance, HR, and safeguarding policies were developed for participating dioceses, ensuring long-term institutional strengthening and compliance with best practices.
- 6. Training of Wukari Diocesan Staff on Risk and Asset Management
 - Earlier in the year, an assessment carried out by Caritas Nigeria using the Caritas Internationalis tool revealed significant gaps in asset and risk management across various dioceses, particularly in Wukari, where ineffective asset tracking and a lack of a comprehensive risk

management framework hindered operations. To address these challenges, a workshop was organized for 19 participants, including finance officers, asset managers, and diocesan leaders. The training focused on modern asset management systems, core risk management principles, and practical skills in tracking and mitigating risks.

Lessons Learnt

- i. The Project Management training for Diocesan Education Coordinators and related capacity-building initiatives demonstrated the importance of structured training in enhancing project planning, execution, monitoring, and evaluation.
- ii. Standardized methodologies, stakeholder engagement, and the use of modern tools significantly improved coordination and program implementation.
- iii. Specialized training for Caritas Nigeria staff strengthened project cycle management, accountability, and institutional support structures. The PMD Pro framework proved effective in

- addressing skill gaps and increasing efficiency, particularly in agriculture, livelihoods, and humanitarian interventions.
- iv. Strategic partnerships, such as the collaboration with Jos and Pankshin Arch/dioceses on the AEJ-WAY Project, highlighted the value of cross-diocesan cooperation in securing grants and implementing justice initiatives.
- v. Training in resource mobilization and project cycle management equipped diocesan staff with proposal development and financial sustainability skills, leading to the creation of tailored resource mobilization plans. The successful application of these skills was evident in seed grant projects, where dioceses implemented impactful initiatives such as WASH interventions, gaining national and international recognition.
- vi. Financial and human resource management training strengthened internal controls, budgeting, reporting, and regulatory compliance, enhancing transparency and accountability within diocesan structures.
- vii. The introduction of safeguarding training reinforced the protection of

vulnerable groups, while the development of finance, HR, and safeguarding policies institutionalized best practices and improved governance.

Innovations/Best Practices

- i. The strategy that worked best was the tripartite approach to capacity building: The project employed a holistic capacity strengthening approach that consists of three core components:
- ii. Capacity building to develop knowledge, skills and attitudes of individuals and teams;
- iii. Institutional strengthening to develop organizations' systems and structures needed to function effectively, work towards sustainability and achieve goals.
- iv. Accompaniment, which combined coaching, mentoring, and supportive supervision with continuous improvement and applied learning.

Next Steps

- Expand project implementation from two dioceses to six dioceses per fiscal year.
- ii. Strengthen training content and delivery to incorporate emerging best practices, digital project management tools, and sectorspecific needs.
- iii. Enhance institutionalization and sustainability of project management frameworks, financial management

- systems, and safeguarding policies into their operational structures, to ensure long-term impact.
- iv. Strengthen Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability, and Learning (MEAL) that will include a robust tracking system to assess progress, measure impact, and document best practices across dioceses.

KEY PROGRAMMATIC CHALLENGES ACROSS ALL PROJECTS

Health

- Recurrent insecurity and sit-at-home orders in the South East disrupting service provision
- Staff attrition impacts negatively on program and performance.
- Occasional stock-out of commodities such as TB LF-LAM and Visitec CD4 rapid test kits.
- Sub-optimal GoN support in program implementation.

Emergency Response and Humanitarian Services

- Rehabilitation delays for the stabilization centre and shortages of therapeutic feeds and drugs posed significant obstacles.
- Delayed input supplies and budget constraints affected timely execution.
- Tight budgets and delays in determining assessment types limited resources and slowed progress.
- Accommodation shortages at the United Nations hub delayed staff mobilization.
- Limited therapeutic centres affected malnutrition case referrals
- Bias in beneficiary registration by community leaders.

Environment

 Lack of adequate funding to ensure adequate care of target tree planting efforts across the country.

Agriculture and Livelihood

Extreme weather conditions.

Safety and security concerns.

Limited access to remote areas highlighted the need for adaptive strategies, including robust security measures, mobile outreach teams, and stronger partner coordination.

Good Governance

- Caritas Africa funding is temporary, thus interventions may not be sustainable.
- There are restrictions with foreign grants, such as Caritas Africa's, thus affecting the meetings of advocacy groups that hold the government accountable for irresponsible borrowing and indiscriminate spending of borrowed funds.
- · Lack of funding for the establishment of the JDPC project.

Institutional Capacity Strenghtening (ICS)

- Resource constraints, including funding and personnel, which limited the ability to effectively scale training and mentorship across six dioceses per fiscal year.
- This expansion could further result in uneven adoption of best practices, requiring customized support to ensure all dioceses benefit equally.
- Also, logistical and coordination complexities will increase as more dioceses participate, necessitating improved planning, scheduling, and remote support mechanisms.

Child Protection Refugee Response

- The Life skill intervention program lacks "sustainability" as there is no startup kit or capital to enable livelihood.
- Family Tracing and Reunification (FTR) is slow, which further extends the burden of alternative care.

UNHCR IDP Project:

- Funding delays and limited infrastructure affected timelines and activity efficiency.
- Bias in beneficiary registration by community leaders.


UNHCR Refugee response Project:

• The food shortage/malnutrition in the refugee communities of Madagali, Michika, Mubi North and Mubi South LGAs is getting worse, as evidenced by the rising number of malnutrition cases reported nearly every week.

Implementation of the Catholic Social Teaching Curriculum for Staff of CBCN Agencies & Departments

The Catholic Bishops Conference of Nigeria (CBCN) has introduced the Catholic Social Teaching (CST) program to educate its agencies on the principles of CST and their practical application in daily work and personal life. This initiative aims to deepen the understanding of social teachings of the Church among staff, reinforcing its role in promoting justice, dignity, and social responsibility within the Church and society.

The curriculum is designed to provide both theoretical knowledge and practical tools that empower participants to integrate CST principles into their workplaces, communities, and the wider Nigerian society. Its approach is based on the Church's methodology for addressing social justice using the See, Judge and Act strategy. By bridging faith with action, the program ensures that Catholic agencies uphold and advocate for values such as promoting human dignity, solidarity, the common good, among others.

Over the course of eight weeks, participants undergo structured training sessions covering core CST themes, ethical decision-making, and real-life case studies. These classes encourage critical thinking and foster discussions on how Catholic values can shape policies and programs within the CBCN agencies and the society at large.

Following the training, participants are required to take a comprehensive examination to assess their understanding and readiness to apply CST principles effectively. So far, a total of 222 staff members of the CBCN agencies and departments at the headquarters have been trained, demonstrating their

commitment to ethical leadership and social transformation while others at the state and regional offices will also undergo the trainings in the new year. This program is implemented in partnership with Veritas University Abuja and supported by the Catholic Relief Services

NEW PARTNERSHIPS

Caritas Nigeria engaged with the Citi Foundation and submitted a proposal for the Global Innovation Challenge on Homelessness. The proposal was successful and Caritas Nigeria has been awarded a grant to provide secure, dignified, and sustainable housing solutions for vulnerable populations in Adamawa and Bayelsa States, Nigeria. The project, Integrative Solutions for Humanitarian Housing Support, will be implemented for two years. In securing the Citi Foundation grant, Caritas Nigeria, has gained recognition from the Charities Aid Foundation of America (CAF America), affording the organization futuristic funding opportunities.

Similarly, Caritas Nigeria has established a new partnership with the Ford Foundation to activate systems and structures within the Church to respond to Gender Based Violence in Nigeria.

Caritas Nigeria also collaborated with organizations who share similar values to amplify the voice of the voiceless across communities, at the state and at the national levels. The organization will continue to explore opportunities of partnerships with diverse stakeholders to increase support and funding so that more beneficiaries can be reached with different services to ensure fullness of life for all.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY



INTRODUCTION/OVERVIEW

This financial statement provides a detailed breakdown of our income, expenditure, and financial position, for one full fiscal year (split between 2023 and 2024). It offers transparency and accountability to our partners, donors, and stakeholders.

In 2024, our total income increased by 113.0%, reaching \$\frac{1}{2}7.35\$ billion, up from \$\frac{1}{2}.84\$ billion in 2023. This growth was fuelled by a 116.9% increase in grants from donors and a 2.9% increase in core funds, demonstrating the trust and confidence placed in us by our supporters. At the same time, our total expenditure rose by 113.4% to \$\frac{1}{2}5.88\$ billion, reflecting our efforts to scale up programs, enhance operational capacity, and deliver meaningful impact to our beneficiaries.


Despite the significant increase in expenditure, we achieved a surplus of \(\frac{1}{2}\)1.47 billion, which represents a 108.0% increase over the previous year.

The reported income is pro-rata share with some incomes spanning across fiscal years. All amounts are reported in Nigerian Naira.

INCOME ANALYSIS


For the entire fiscal year, a total income of \$\\$40,183,603,332.70 (forty billion, one hundred and eighty-three million, six hundred and three thousand three hundred and thirty-two Naira, seventy Kobo) was realized. The income was clearly divided between Core Funds (2%) and Grants from Donors (98%). Total income increased by 113.0%, rising from \$\\$12.84 billion in 2023 to \$\\$27.35 billion in 2024.






Core Funds


Core funds income grew modestly by 2.9%, reaching ₹445.9 million in 2024, up from ₹433.3 million in 2023. This growth was primarily fueled by a 39.5% increase in donations, which rose to ₹320.1 million, reflecting the generosity of our individual and corporate donors. However, parish collections declined by 43.1%, likely due to the rising economic crunch in the society





Other core funds income streams showed positive trends:

- Lenten collections increased by 2.4%, demonstrating consistent supportfor our Lenten initiatives.
- The PMD PRO Training Program saw a 28.6% increase in income, highlighting the growing demand for our training services.
- The newly introduced Lenten booklets as a new income stream, generated ₦695,000 in 2024.



Grants from Donors

Grants income more than doubled, increasing by **116.9%** to ₹26.9 billion in 2024, up from ₹12.4 billion in 2023. This growth was driven by substantial increases in funding from several key donors:




Grants income more than doubled, increasing by **116.9**% to ₩26.9 billion in 2024, up from ₩12.4 billion in 2023. This growth was driven by substantial increases in funding from several key donors:

- The **US Centres for Disease Control (CDC)** remained our largest donor, contributing ₩19.6 billion, a **116.8% increase** over 2023.
- The European Union (ECHO SaHARA) and German MFA more than doubled their support, with increases of 131.5% and 194.9%, respectively.
- Norway MFA and GLOBAL FUND TB PPM also provided significant funding, with growth rates of 314.7% and 251.8%, respectively.
- New grants from the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO), HIAS/Refuge Point, and the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) further diversified our funding base.

While most grants saw substantial growth, a few experienced declines:


- CAFOD and UNHCR grants decreased by 3.2% and 6.1%, respectively.
- The National Humanitarian Fund (NHF) and Palladium grants declined by 37.4% and 8.8%, respectively.







EXPENDITURE ANALYSIS

For the period under review a total of \\ \frac{\dagger}{38,006,788,263.49}\) (Thirty-eight billion, six million, seven hundred and eighty-eight thousand, two hundred and sixty-three Naira, forty-nine Kobo) was expended.







Total expenditure between the years increased by 113.4%, rising from \\ 12.13\) billion in 2023 to \\ 25.88\) billion in 2024 reflecting our commitment to scaling up programs, improving operational efficiency, and delivering impactful services to our beneficiaries.


A breakdown of how funds were allocated across key expenditure categories is given below:

Project Costs

Project costs more than doubled, increasing by 124.3% to **N9.82** billion in 2024, up from **N4.38** billion in 2023. This growth was primarily driven by increased sub-grants to partners, which rose to **N9.82** billion, reflecting our expanded program reach and collaboration with implementing partners.

Assets and Equipment

Expenditure on assets and equipment decreased by 36.8%, from \\$522.9 million in 2023 to \\$330.6 million in 2024. This decline was due to reduced spending on laptop computers and accessories (-24.7%) and the absence of vehicle purchases in 2024. However, we invested in internet facility upgrades (+17,367.5%) and office furniture (+349.7%) to enhance operational efficiency.



Supplies

Expenditure on supplies saw a remarkable increase of 730.8%, rising from \\$625.8 million in 2023 to \\$5.20 billion in 2024. This was largely due to a significant increase in spending on basic care and support commodities (+5,945.6%), which grew to \\$3.27 billion, as well as higher costs for laboratory supplies (+111.3%) and printing of forms (+232.4%). These investments were critical to supporting our program activities and ensuring the availability of essential resources.



Personnel and General Operating Costs


Personnel and general operating costs increased by **59.4%**, reaching ₱10.53 billion in 2024, up from ₱6.60 billion in 2023. Key areas of expenditure included:

Salaries: Increased by 56.4% to ₦6.41 billion, reflecting our commitment to fair compensation and staff retention.

Training of Partners and Meetings: Rose by 131.1% to №1.08 billion, highlighting our focus on capacity building and collaboration.

Travel - Domestic: Increased by 82.4% to ₩1.52 billion, supporting program monitoring and implementation across regions.

Surplus/Carry-Over Funds



Despite the significant increase in expenditure, we achieved a surplus of \\$1.47 billion, which represents a 108.0% increase over the \\$706.6 million surplus in 2023. This surplus will be carried over to the new financial year, ensuring the sustainability of our programs and providing a buffer for future needs.

Key Insights

- The increase in expenditure aligns with our strategic goals of scaling up programs, improving service delivery, and investing in operational capacity.
- Significant investments in project costs and supplies demonstrate our commitment to program effectiveness and beneficiary support.
- The growth in personnel costs reflects our focus on retaining skilled staff and building the capacity of our partners.
- The surplus achieved in 2024 underscores our prudent financial management and commitment to long-term sustainability.

CONCLUSION

The financial results for 2024 reflect a year of remarkable growth, strategic investments, and impactful program delivery. With a 113.0% increase in total income and a 113.4% rise in expenditure, we have demonstrated our ability to scale operations, deliver on our mission, and maintain financial sustainability. The achievement of a \mathbb{1}.47 billion surplus underscores our commitment to prudent financial management and positions us strongly for the future.
